After the uproar had ceased, Paul called the disciples to *himself*, embraced *them*, and departed to go to Macedonia.

Luke gives only a brief summary of Paul's journey at this point. Paul's writing fills in some of the details that Luke omits. Upon leaving Ephesus to go to Macedonia, Paul stopped in Troas, hoping to meet Titus there. Titus had been in Corinth. Having sent the letter of 1 Corinthians from Ephesus, and being deeply concerned about how the Corinthians had received that letter, Paul was anxious to hear Titus' report about the Corinthian Christians. When Titus did not come to him in Troas, he traveled on to Macedonia (2 Cor. 2:12-13). In Macedonia Paul was greatly troubled but found comfort when Titus finally came and gave him a good report about the Corinthians (2 Cor. 7:4-7). After receiving that report, he wrote the letter of 2 Corinthians from Macedonia.

And when he had gone over those parts, and had given them much exhortation, he came into Greece. Luke does not specify the cities Paul visited in Macedonia. They must have included Philippi. Thessalonica, and Berea. Though Luke does not mention it. Paul was taking up the collection for poor saints in Jerusalem, and the brethren in Macedonia gave with exemplary generosity (2 Cor. 8:1-5). Paul gave them much exhortation (parakaleo). i.e., exhortation, encouragement, comfort. From Macedonia, Paul went into Greece. Greece (hellas) was the popular term used for Achaia, the province in which Corinth was located. Paul had promised to come to Corinth after passing through Macedonia (1 Cor. 16:5-6); now he was fulfilling that promise.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Now when he had gone over that region and encouraged them with many words, he came to Greece

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> and stayed three months. And when the Jews plotted against him as he was about to sail to Syria, he decided to return through Macedonia.

- <sup>11</sup> Now when he had come up, had broken bread and eaten, and talked a long while, even till daybreak, he departed.
- <sup>12</sup> And they brought the young man in alive, and they were not a little comforted.
- <sup>13</sup> Then we went ahead to the ship and sailed to Assos, there intending to take Paul on board; for so he had given orders, intending himself to go on foot.
- <sup>14</sup> And when he met us at Assos, we took him on board and came to Mitylene.
- $^{15}$  We sailed from there, and the next day came opposite Chios. The following day we arrived at Samos and stayed at Trogyllium. The next day we came to Miletus.
- <sup>16</sup> For Paul had decided to sail past Ephesus, so that he would not have to spend time in Asia; for he was hurrying to be at Jerusalem, if possible, on the Day of Pentecost.

<sup>18</sup> And when they had come to him, he said to them: "You know, from the first day that I came to Asia, in what manner I always lived among you,

- <sup>19</sup> serving the Lord with all humility, with many tears and trials which happened to me by the plotting of the Jews;
- <sup>20</sup> how I kept back nothing that was helpful, but proclaimed it to you, and taught you publicly and from house to house,
- <sup>21</sup> testifying to Jews, and also to Greeks, repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ.
- <sup>22</sup> And see, now I go bound in the spirit to Jerusalem, not knowing the things that will happen to me there,
- <sup>23</sup> except that the Holy Spirit testifies in every city, saying that chains and tribulations await me.
- <sup>24</sup> But none of these things move me; nor do I count my life dear to myself, so that I may finish my race with joy, and the ministry which I received from the Lord Jesus, to testify to the gospel of the grace of God.

- <sup>25</sup> And indeed, now I know that you all, among whom I have gone preaching the kingdom of God, will see my face no more.
- <sup>26</sup> Therefore I testify to you this day that I *am* innocent of the blood of all *men*.
- <sup>27</sup> For I have not shunned to declare to you the whole counsel of God.
- <sup>28</sup> Therefore take heed to yourselves and to all the flock, among which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to shepherd the church of God which He purchased with His own blood.

Qualifications 1st Timothy 3:1-7 & Titus 1:5-9

- <sup>29</sup> For I know this, that after my departure savage wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock.
